However, because doctors usually have no immediate way of knowing whether an infection is bacterial or viral, they may still prescribe antibiotics for these patients.

Antarctica Heat Comes From the Deep

The Antarctic ice sheet is a giant water reservoir. The ice cap on the southern continent is on average 2,100 meters thick and contains about 70 percent of the world's fresh water. The water temperatures on the West Antarctic shelf are rising. The reason for this is a contact with predominantly warm water from greater depths, which as a result of global change now reaches the shallow shelf. There it has the potential to accelerate the glacier melt from below and trigger the sliding of big alaciers.


