This last July was the planet's warmest month on record. And it's almost dead certain lock that this year will beat last year as the warmest year on record. July's average temperature was 16.6 Celsius (61.86 degrees Fahrenheit), beating the previous global mark set in 1998 and 2010 by 0.08 C. That's a large margin for weather records.

Gender Disparities in Water, Sanitation and Global Health

While fetching water, women have increased risks of infection from physically transmitted diseases, such as diarrhoea. Chronic or persistent infection, in addition to the physical effort of carrying water, causes fatigue that is not only harmful to women's wellbeing, but also affects productivity and reduces energy and time for economic opportunities. Navigation of uneven terrain with substantial water loads can cause injury, especially if women are pregnant or have recently given birth.


Nearly One Million People Face Food Emergency in Drought-Hit Guatemala

Nearly one million people in Guatemala are struggling to feed themselves as continued poor rainfall has led to drought and shrunken harvests, worsening hunger among the poor, the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) said. Drought, a recurring problem in Central America's dry corridor, is exacerbated by extreme and erratic weather brought by climate change.


How Land Rights can Help End Child Marriage

UN Health Agency Kicks-Off Campaign Honoring World's Health Workers

Attacks against health care workers and facilities are flagrant violations of international humanitarian law. Health workers have an obligation to treat the sick and injured without discrimination. All parties to conflict must respect that obligation. According to the WHO, in 2014 alone there were 372 attacks in 32 countries on health staff, resulting in 603 deaths and 958 injuries, while similar incidents have been recorded this year.

Truth, Reconciliation and Prisons

As is the case with adult Aboriginals, Aboriginal children and youth are over-represented in custody: girls make up 49% and boys 36% of admissions to youth custody. The TRC report puts it starkly at page 224: "Many of today's Aboriginal children and youth live with the legacy of residential schools every day, as they struggle to deal with high rates of addictions, fetal alcohol disorder, mental health issues, family violence, incarceration of parents and the intrusion of child- welfare authorities. All these factors place them at greater risk of involvement with crime."


