Across the Middle East, Doctors Are Being Killed Like Never Before

Attacks against hospitals and clinics from Afghanistan to South Sudan and Yemen have grown distressingly common in recent years, killing hundreds, forcing the shuttering of numerous medical facilities, and adding to the misery of already war-torn nations. In South Sudan, MSF facilities were recently looted in the town of Pibor after fighting in the town forced the agency's doctors and staff to flee to a U.N. compound for safety.

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Ocean Acidification Causing Worse Than Feared Decline of Great Barrier Reef

The first-of-a-kind study of more than 3,000 coral reefs off the northeast coast of Australia reveals how some parts are already experiencing the kind of conditions scientists were predicting many decades from now. Since humans began industrializing, the oceans have absorbed about 30% of the extra carbon dioxide (CO2) in the atmosphere. This is changing the chemistry of the seawater. As the oceans absorb CO2 they become gradually acidic.

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Medicine in India: 'Qualified Quacks' and a Baffling Drug Landscape

Data is emerging that show how dismal medical care is for many in India, with providers routinely failing to diagnose common diseases and frequently prescribing useless and hazardous drugs. In North India, for example, the chances of getting a helpful prescription at the doctor's office are no better than a coin toss, while you have about an 80 percent chance of getting stuff you don't need. Child deaths remain more common in India than in Bangladesh and Nepal, where the average income is lower. Poor people may be hit harder because they are more likely to go to the free government clinics, where doctors use particularly little effort.

Sanitary Pads and School Attendance: The Numbers and What They Mean

What if not having sanitary supplies meant days without school?

This is among the many claims from nongovernmental organizations that girls miss school due to lack of access to sanitary pads, the embarrassment of leaks, or the pain and discomfort from using rags. In some cases, NGOs even argue that menstruation is the "number one reason that girls miss school." If this were true, it would follow that all that is needed to achieve gender parity in secondary schools is the distribution of a few sanitary products.

Targeting the Families of Cholera Patients Could Have a Major Impact on the Reduction of Disease

WHO estimates that cholera causes up to 142,000 deaths worldwide each year. It is most usually transmitted through contaminated water and poor hygiene practices. Family members and household contacts are at more than 100 times higher risk of contracting cholera after a patient seeks hospital care. Targeting the household contacts of cholera patients – who are themselves at high risk of contracting the disease – could dramatically cut the spread of cholera.

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Panasonic Hails New World Record With Super-Efficient Solar Cell

Japanese electronics giant Panasonic announced it has officially created the world's most efficient crystalline silicon-based solar module. It is a technological breakthrough that could deliver more power per square foot of photovoltaic (PV) cells than ever before. To create the record-breaking module, Panasonic developed a unique "silicon heterojunction structure" - a structure that covers the silicon base surface with an additional silicon layer - that features electrodes on the front and back to enable the most efficient use of sunlight. Panasonic continues to develop the module to make it more efficient and suitable for mass production.

Climate Change Altering Greenland Ice Sheet and Accelerating Sea Level Rise

The Greenland ice sheet has traditionally been pictured as a bit of a sponge for glacier meltwater, but new research has found it is rapidly losing the ability to buffer its contribution to rising sea levels. Researchers were interested in the thin porous near-surface firn layer, and how its physical structure is changing rapidly with climate change. They looked at how the last couple of years of melt have really altered the structure of the ice sheet firn and made it behave differently to future melt due to climate change.

Seattle-Area Salmon Are Loaded With Anti-Depressants and Other Drugs Thanks to Human Waste

The everyday chemicals that humans ingest to relieve pain, fight depression and diabetes, or treat infection are winding up in the tissue of fish. Over 4,000 pharmaceuticals are currently in use or in development and many of them are finding their way into rivers, streams, and lakes, raising concerns about how exposure could impact wildlife, or even humans who consume fish. While the presence of toxins sounds alarm bells, more research is needed to understand the impact of chemicals on aquatic and human life.

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Training Teachers: Meet the young CEO launching Teach For Ghana

More than half of children not enrolled in school live in sub-Saharan Africa, according to the United Nations. And on average, there is one reading textbook for about two students and one math textbook for about three students in sub-Saharan Africa. Teach For Ghana — part of the Teach For All global network — officially launched last month in Accra. It is the first Teach For All partner organization on the African continent. Teach For All partner organizations are bound together by the philosophy that recruiting top talent from diverse backgrounds into the teaching profession for at least two years contributes to ending educational inequity.






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A Review of Frameworks on the Determinants of Health

Our health is influenced by many factors such as the work we do, our level of education, our income, where we live, the quality of our early childhood experiences and the physical environment that surrounds us (PHAC, 2008). These factors are called the determinants of health.

Frameworks, or visual depictions, can improve understanding of complex issues such as the determinants of health by explaining their impact on the well-being of individuals, communities and populations. Through clear depictions of the complex relationships among determinants, frameworks can support innovative planning and policy development by identifying opportunities for health and other sectors to act to reduce health inequities experienced by certain population groups.

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Why One Woman Stole 47 Million Academic Papers and Made Them All Free to Read

Many academic journals are extremely expensive. Want to read just one article? That could cost you around \$30. The best way to access academic papers is through universities or libraries. But those institutions can pay millions of dollars a year to subscribe to a comprehensive collection. Alexandra Elbakyan has had enough. Elbakyan is a Russia-based neuroscientist turned academic Robin Hood. In 2011 she founded the website Sci-Hub, which has grown to host some 47 million academic papers — Elbakyan claims this is nearly all the paywalled scientific knowledge that exists in the world. These papers are free for anyone to view and download.

For students and researchers around the globe who can't afford academic journals, Elbakyan is a hero. For academic publishers that have historically been shielded from competition, she's a villain.

Either way, what she's doing is most definitely illegal.

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


Haiti Earthquake: Five Years Later, Country Still Feeling Aftershocks

January marked the fifth anniversary of the 7.0 magnitude earthquake that devastated Haiti, killing more than 300,000 people according to estimates by the Haitian government. Tens of thousands of homes, businesses, schools and government buildings were leveled, with roughly a quarter of all the country's civil servants killed and much of its public infrastructure destroyed.

Haiti is often cited as the poorest nation in the Western hemisphere with roughly 60 percent of its population living on less than \$2 a day. Despite this severe blow to an already struggling economy, an overwhelming majority of the 1.5 million people left homeless by the quake have been resettled. Thousands of new homes as well as hospitals, schools and roads have been built. From a school rebuilt with help from UNICEF to a pioneering community for children with disabilities run by Partners in Health, Haiti is a country bouncing back from catastrophe.

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
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
