



KitKat (Nestlé) Scraps Partnership With Fairtrade in 'Profoundly Disappointing' Move

Fairtrade said 27,000 small-scale producers in Malawi, Fiji and Côte d'Ivoire are set to lose out. Nestlé [announced](#) plans on Tuesday to end the partnership between its KitKat brand and the Fairtrade Foundation, a nonprofit organization that protects the livelihood of producers in developing countries. The UK arm of the multinational Swiss corporation has decided it will end its decade-long affiliation despite warnings from Fairtrade that thousands of farmers would be harmed by the move. From October, Nestlé will source the cocoa for its KitKats from farms working with the Rainforest Alliance instead — a similar charity that focuses more on biodiversity than workers' interests.

It means that [£2 million](#) will be lost in Fairtrade premiums every year, affecting 27,000 small-scale producers in Malawi, Fiji and Côte d'Ivoire. The premiums are not just about income either, but also help fund community projects like schools, public kitchens and women's empowerment programmes. Read more at [Global Citizen](#).

Brazil Declares Crop Emergency As Locust Plague Nears Border



RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — Brazil's agriculture ministry has declared a crop emergency in two southern states amid the possibility a cloud of locusts could enter the country from Argentina. The "state of phytosanitary emergency" is a bureaucratic step paving the way for Brazil's government to implement plans to suppress the plague and take other emergency measures in case the insects reach the farmland in Rio Grande do Sul and Santa Catarina states. The ministry said in a statement it doesn't currently expect that to occur. The cloud of locusts that originated in Paraguay and caused massive damage to its corn plantations has spread through northeast Argentina and devoured crops there. [Read More at AP News](#).

Grey Whales - Protected On One Side Of The Border, Hunted On The Other



A grey whale called Saddle is a longtime summer resident of Clayoquot Sound. Researcher Jim Darling has photographed the whale 20 times between 1974 and 2019. Individual whales can be identified by the distinct markings on their backs. For almost five decades, biologist Darling has studied the grey whales that regularly return to forage in the waters off the west coast of Canada instead of completing the lengthy migration undertaken by the main herd.

Approximately 27,000 eastern North Pacific grey whales make a monumental annual trek from breeding and calving lagoons along Mexico's Baja California peninsula to summer feeding grounds in the far northern Bering, Beaufort and Chukchi Seas. The northward migration lasts from February until May. Then, in October, the whales, led by pregnant females, leave the Arctic feeding grounds and again travel up to 11,000 kilometres to return to the warm lagoons of Baja. However, about 250 animals opt to skip the full migration and spend from spring until fall feeding along the coast from northern California to southeast Alaska where there are different hunting laws. 

In line with the decision taken by the COPASAH Steering Committee after the **Global Symposium in October 2019**, the Global Secretariat of COPASAH is shifting from Centre for Health and Social Justice (CHSJ), New Delhi, India to the Africa Health Budget Network (AHBN) in Abuja, Nigeria. This is a testament to the relevance and growth of COPASAH which was established at a meeting on Health Governance and Accountability at the Community Level, in Johannesburg, South Africa nearly ten years ago. The first Global Secretariat of COPASAH was hosted by CEGSS at Guatemala in Latin America after which it moved to CHSJ, New Delhi, India in Asia. Bayer To Pay More Than \$10 Billion To Resolve Cancer Lawsuits Over Weedkiller Roundup



Bayer will pay more than \$10 billion to end tens of thousands of lawsuits filed over its Roundup weedkiller. The settlement also resolves many other cases over the herbicide dicamba as well as water contaminated with toxic chemicals called PCBs. Many plaintiffs say Roundup's active ingredient — glyphosate — caused them to develop cancer. Roundup was developed by Monsanto, which Bayer bought in 2018 for \$63 billion.

The decision to resolve the Roundup cases, Bayer CEO Werner Baumann [said](#), will "return the conversation about the safety and utility of glyphosate-based herbicides to the scientific and regulatory arena and to the full body of science." The Roundup settlement does not cover three cases that have already gone to trial and that will continue through the appeals process. In one of those cases, a California jury awarded a couple [more than \\$2 billion](#) in damages before a court sharply lowered that amount. [Read More at NPR](#)

CANADA JUST INVESTED \$100 MILLION INTO VEGAN MEAT

Canada's vegan meat industry just got a huge boost. The country just announced a nearly \$100 million investment in vegan protein. Prime Minister Justin Trudeau announced that the multi-million dollar funding would go to Merit Functional Foods, a Winnipeg-based company that specializes in producing plant-based proteins. Merit will use the funds to build its new commercial-scale protein production plant. The facility will be capable of utilizing 10,000 metric tonnes of yellow peas, an ingredient used to make plant-based meat like the Beyond Burger available at A&W Canada, in its first year. It will also produce an estimated 17,000 tonnes of canola seed.

"As people around the world start eating more plant-based products, we have an opportunity to bring together Canadian innovation and Canadian crops, and a chance to create good, well-paying jobs," Trudeau said. *"This facility will be a world leader in plant-based proteins and create good jobs in a fast-growing field,"* he continued. Coronavirus Crisis Could Cause \$25tn Fossil Fuel industry Collapse

The coronavirus outbreak could trigger a \$25tn (£20tn) collapse in the fossil fuel industry by accelerating a terminal decline for the world's most polluting companies. A study has found that the value of the world's fossil fuel reserves could fall by two-thirds, sooner than the industry expects, because the Covid-19 crisis has hastened the peak for oil, gas and coal demand. The looming fossil fuel collapse could pose "a significant threat to global financial stability" by wiping out the market value of fossil fuel companies, according to financial thinktank Carbon Tracker. International Energy Agency (IEA) Floats 'Green Recovery' Plan To Boost Economies, Cut Emissions



The International Energy Agency (IEA) has unveiled a three-year, post-pandemic master plan to simultaneously salvage the global economy and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Drawn up jointly with the International Monetary Fund (IMF), the 2021-2023 blueprint aims -- in each of those years -- to boost GDP growth 1.1%, "save or create" nine million jobs, and slash CO2 emissions by 1.5 billion tonnes. Canada, Ontario Need to Address Toxic Mercury Legacy In Grassy Narrows



This past June 27 marked three years since [federal](#) and [provincial](#) authorities in Ontario, Canada, promised to clean up decades-old mercury contamination. Affected Indigenous residents are still waiting. In the 1960s and early 1970s, a chemical plant dumped around 10 tons of toxic mercury into a river upstream from Asubpeeschoewagong Netum Anishinabek (also known as "Grassy Narrows First Nation"), contaminating culturally important fish the community depends on for food. In [repeatedly](#) failing to take action to clean up the river, subsequent governments have subjected community members to half a century of devastating health [impacts](#), including [early death](#). In waterbodies, mercury converts into [methylmercury](#), a potent neurotoxin, which accumulates in fish and then people, reaching increasing levels of contamination and risk to human health.

In 2017, community member Darwin Fobister, then 20, [told Human Rights Watch](#), "[Mercury poisoning] is going on and on and it's passing to younger and younger people." Fobister described having difficulty balancing, trembling in his hands, and spells of tunnel vision – all symptoms of mercury poisoning. A 2016 [review](#) of mercury levels in Ontario fish confirmed that fish consumed in Grassy Narrows are the most mercury-contaminated in the province. The federal government, meanwhile, [maintains](#): "Canada has well-established ... programs to identify, assess, remediate and risk manage contaminated sites," in line with its obligations under the [United Nations Minamata Convention on Mercury](#), which seeks to protect human health from mercury. Battery Giant CATL Ready To Make Million Mile, 16 Year Batteries For More Than Tesla



The battery field is moving so quickly that the idea of the million-mile battery seemed far out [just a year ago](#). Now it's within sight—likely in the next few years—for [Tesla](#) and [General Motors](#), among others, and supplier CATL has revealed that it's not exclusive to a particular automaker's R&D department. CATL has developed a battery pack that will last 16 years or 2 million kilometers (1.24 million miles), and will offer it to any interested automaker, company chairman Zeng Yuqun said in an interview with [Bloomberg](#). The million-mile battery will cost only about 10% more than batteries in current electric cars, Zeng said. That premium isn't as daunting as it sounds, because lithium-ion battery prices have been falling rapidly; according to Bloomberg New Energy finance they fell 13% on a pack basis just from 2018 to 2019.

African Dust Storms Are The Latest 'New' Old Weather Phenomena

As I type this on a Friday morning, there is a high likelihood that you have already seen social media posts of "African dust" sunrises or sunsets. You have also likely seen references to Godzilla or friends saying "wow, this has never happened before, right?" To be clear, this dust outbreak is certainly an anomaly event and poses potential health risks for people all along its pathway so it is important that the media and other stakeholders have picked up on it. Herein, I officially induct "African dust storms" into the "new" old weather phenomena Hall of Fame. Let me explain.

To illustrate just how extreme this current dust storm is, [FEMA scientist Michael Lowry tweeted](#) the following: "The ongoing Saharan #dust outbreak across the tropical Atlantic is *by far* the most extreme of the MODIS satellite record — our most detailed, continuous record of global dust back to 2002." The graphic above shows a quantity called [aerosol optical depth \(AOD\)](#). AOD provides an indication of how much particulate matter or aerosols are in a column of the atmosphere. This event clearly exceeds other dust events of the past two decades.



**Maternal Health: Global
Perspectives, Challenges and
Issues (Edited by Juan Sims)**



In this compilation, a framework for exploring coupled physical-social systems impacts on health are presented. Specifically, this system is used to articulate three climate change impact pathways for maternal health: vector borne diseases; water, sanitation, and hygiene; and nutrition.

Following this, *Maternal Health: Global Perspectives, Challenges and Issues* moves beyond discussing the implications of maternal obesity on maternal and child health and focuses on why it is imperative to consolidate current evidence into practice and policy around prevention. The authors explore what is needed to translate findings from epidemiological, clinical trial, secondary research and evidence synthesis into evidence-based programs.

The concluding study analyzes data on disparities in maternal mortality by race, age and causes of death in the interest of identifying whether pregnancy-related deaths may be avoided in preventable conditions if treated earlier, thereby closing the racial disparities of maternal mortality rates in the United States.

Students Seek Therapy-like Help From Professors Online

Faced with high levels of anxiety and stress, some students have sought therapy-like consultations from their professors. "I am not a psychologist, but I do like to listen to people," says Irina Popescu in a reflection on how the desire to acknowledge the difficulties her students were facing and the move to online learning took an unanticipated physical, emotional and mental toll on staff and students alike. Popescu further notes that students tend to gravitate towards people they are familiar with, and so awareness of counselling is not the core issue. "If we are to persevere during the upcoming academic year," she concludes, "we need to understand how to embody those new roles -- not only as educators but also as mentors and oftentimes as individuals put in a position of being crisis counsellors without any credentials."

COUNTRIES RANKED BY NUMBER OF NEW COVID-19 CASES, JUNE 25 - JULY 2, 2020










TOP 12 COUNTRIES: NUMBER OF NEW COVID-19 CASES ON JULY 1, 2020


India (Population 1.339 billion, 2017)






COVID-19 Cases (Total, per 100K)




