"We are going to get off the sidelines of manufacturing solar panels and wind farms," the president said, adding that the budget package will help double the number of electric cars on US roads within three years and provide 500,000 new charging stations for the vehicles. "We are once again going to be the innovators. It's a big deal."

"The weather is not going to get better, it's going to get a heck of a lot worse," Biden continued. "It's a blinking code red for America and the world."

Globally, as almost since the very beginning, the situation continues very serious in many countries, especially those

in central east Europe and the UK. It's somewhat better in Canada this week.

Over the last week there were about 3 million new cases and 48,000 deaths (both about the same). About 200 million people received a vaccine (down slightly), or an average of some 30 million doses per day - impressive. In the USA more than 1 million are getting vaccinated each day. At this rate the world will need another 5 months to achieve 75% coverage, though distribution continues to be grossly distorted, favouring the rich countries.

How Many Climate Disasters Will Today's Children Face? Scientists Release Estimate



Children will, on average, suffer seven times more heat waves and nearly three times more droughts, floods and crop failures due to fast-accelerating climate change, a new report finds. Credit: Yiannis

Children around the world will face a sharp jump in heat waves, floods and droughts in their lives compared to their grandparents, with teenagers from Nepal to Australia urging leaders not to turn a blind eye. Children will, on average, suffer seven times more heat waves and nearly three times more droughts, floods and crop failures due

to fast-accelerating climate change, found a new report from aid agency Save the Children.

Those in low- and middle-income countries will bear the brunt, with Afghan children likely to endure up to 18 times as many heat waves as their elders, and children in Mali likely to live through up to 10 times more crop failures.

"People are suffering, we shouldn't turn a blind eye... Climate change is the biggest crisis of this era," said Anuska, 15, sharing her experience of more heat waves, intense rain and crop losses in her country, Nepal. **Read more at CBC**

Rampant Poaching Forces Elephants to Evolve to Not Have Tusks, Study Finds

Elephants in Mozambique are evolving away from having tusks due to pressure from rampant poaching over decades, according to a daunting new study.

Published in the journal <u>Science</u>, the report from researchers across departments at Princeton University, the non-profit ElephantVoices, Gorongosa National Park in Mozambique, and the University of Idaho, analyzed survey data that suggests natural selection has favoured tusklessness in female elephants—a rare genetic trait that has become more common—amid high rates of poaching and population decline. **Read more at Vice News**

The Coastal GasLink pipeline violates Wet'suwet'en rights and title, and lacks consent of Wet'suwet'en Nation hereditary chiefs. The 37 investors and banks targeted by the campaign include Canada's Big 5 Banks, which last month issued statements committing to justice for Indigenous peoples. RBC sponsored Truth and Reconciliation Week, which included broadcast programs on the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's calls to action. One of these calls is for corporations to commit to meaningful consultation and building respectful relationships with Indigenous peoples before proceeding with economic development projects. Against the backdrop of the banks' recent public commitments to reconciliation, the banks' hypocrisy in financing Coastal GasLink is especially striking. **Read more at Stand.Earth**

In August 1991, health officials in Peru received notice of a suspected case of polio in the small Andean region of Pichanaki. 'World's Most Powerful Tidal Turbine' has Started...

The tidal turbine energy sector is in its infancy, but some innovators are making headway with their recent developments. Orbital Marine Power, a Scotland-based company, has deployed a tidal turbine in an archipelago north of Scotland's mainland and has begun exporting power to the local electricity grid.

Orbital's energy-generating vessel is a floating platform that is moored by anchors in a water body with powerful tides or currents. Once the ideal location has been reached, two 'legs' with rotors at the end of them stretch out and start spinning as the water flows through. Electricity then flows from the turbine through cables on the seabed and into the local onshore electricity network. **Read more at** the Weather Network.



Gamers Without Borders Event Points to Promise of Gaming for Charity

By day, Drew Reyes-Schroeder is director of digital operations at <u>Direct Relief</u>, an emergency medical assistance and disaster relief organization.

But in video game circles, he's known as <u>romscout</u> and specializes in "speedrunning," or completing games as fast as possible, often for a virtual audience from among his 30,000-plus followers on livestreaming platform Twitch.

His two worlds converged this summer as he helped manage Direct Relief's partnership with <u>Gamers Without Borders</u>, which bills itself as the world's largest charity event for esports and gaming.

Now in its second year, Gamers Without Borders is bringing together top esports athletes and teams in head-to-head matches to support global vaccine distribution, with viewers in different parts of the world watching on Twitch and YouTube. They are competing for a share of the \$10 million charity prize fund, and winners can select whether to support Direct Relief; UNICEF; Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance; or International Medical Corps.











Global hot spots for reported cases per capita


- 7-day rolling average of daily new reported cases per 100,000 residents




Doses of covid-19 vaccines administered per 100,000 residents


















In Canada there are currently 604 ICU beds filled.

The Pfizer-BioNTech, Moderna, AstraZeneca-Oxford and Johnson & Johnson vaccines have been approved for use in Canada. Johnson & Johnson's is the first single-dose vaccine Health Canada has approved. The others require two doses for someone to be fully vaccinated.


In the U.S., 425 million doses have been administered

The biggest vaccination campaign in history is underway. More than

7.15 billion doses have been administered across 184 countries, according to data collected by Bloomberg. The latest rate was roughly 30.1 million doses a day.

In the U.S., **425 million doses** have been given so far. An average **1.13 million doses per day** were administered over the last week.


Globally, the latest vaccination rate is **30,103,833 doses** per day, which includes **10,824,787 people** people getting their first shot. At this pace, it will take another **5 months** until **75%** of the population has received at least one dose.
